

## **Registration | Radio & TV Licence Fee**

## Reporting to the Municipal Registration Office (Anmeldung)

After having moved into your apartment/room, you need to register your residence with the municipal authorities within one week, regardless of how long you will be staying. For registering in Duesseldorf, please report to the <u>Registration Office of the city of Duesseldorf (Buergeramt or Einwohnermeldeamt)</u>

- **Please note:** The Registration Office will forward your name and address to the central radio and TV licence agency (*Beitragsservice*) (according to the National Treaty on Licence Fees (*Rundfunkgebuehrenstaatsvertrag*) Section 8, paragraph 4).

## Radio & TV Licence Fee (Rundfunkbeitrag)

• After registering your residence you will receive a notice and registration form from the licence agency (*Beitragsservice*). You need to complete the form and return it in time.

**Please note**: It may take up to a few months until you receive the notice from the agency – nevertheless, you will be obliged to pay the fee for each month since moving to Germany.

- *Per household* (independently of the number of persons living together), a TV & radio licence fee (<u>Rundfunkbeitrag</u>) of €17,89 per month is due. This also applies if you live in student halls of residence.
- If you live in a *shared flat* only one of the inhabitants needs to register for paying the licence fee regularly, the amount is then split among all flatmates. If one of your flatmates is already registered you need to indicate this by completing the form you will receive by post.
  We recommend you to discuss even before you receive the invoice which of your flatmates (ideally a German, if possible) will be paying the licence fee to the authorities and how the others contribute their share.
- As a student, you can only apply for *exemption* from licence fees if you receive a German state Education Advancement Grant (<u>BAfoeG</u>). There is no exceptional rule for students from abroad. →Information on the <u>conditions for exemption from licence fees</u> (in German)
